HISTORY

The Paso del Norte Health Foundation was established in 1995 from the sale of the not-for-profit Providence Memorial Hospital and is one of the largest private foundations on the United States/Mexico border.

The Health Foundation operates in a unique binational environment, which stretches across two countries and three states. The service area includes: Doña Ana, Luna, and Otero Counties in New Mexico; El Paso and Hudspeth Counties in Texas; and the Municipality of Ciudad Juárez, Chihuahua, México. Within the region's population of 2.4 million people, more than 750,000 residents are under the age of 18.

REGIONAL IMPACT

Achievements to improve health and quality of life come through the establishment of partners who are visionaries and work to effectively plan and implement programs that address disease prevention and health education. With the support of the Health Foundation these partners are making an IMPACT and helping change habits for a healthy region.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

More than 150 health stakeholders of the El Paso Behavioral Health Consortium are meeting regularly to examine the community behavioral health system in preparation for future service needs and funding trends. This consortium is a leadership initiative of the Health Foundation.

FRUIT AND VEGETABLE CONSUMPTION

Consumers purchased more fruits and vegetables in grocery stores without increasing their budget through innovative marketing strategies by New Mexico State University, which were funded by the Health Foundation's Healthy Eating and Active Living initiative.

HEALTH INFORMATION EXCHANGE (HIE)

First initiated by the Health Foundation and after nearly four years in planning with major health stakeholders in El Paso County, the HIE will begin exchanging health information among doctors, hospitals and clinics.

HEALTHY EATING AND ACTIVE LIVING

Body mass index declined 10% among 4th graders with Health Foundation funding to schools in the Coordinated Approach To Child Health (CATCH) program, which initiated a best practice active living program within area school districts.

REGIONAL HEALTH FRAMEWORK

Health stakeholders throughout the region worked together to identify regional health issues for all to target and measure. This project is managed by the Health Foundation along with the HealthyPasodelNorte.org website, which provides health data of the region.

SMOKE FREE COMMUNITY

Smoking among adults has decreased from 21.5% to 13.3% in El Paso County. The University of Texas at El Paso campus and the Housing Authority of El Paso facilities recently became smoke free with the collaboration and support from the Health Foundation.

UNDERAGE DRINKING

Communities throughout the region are working with various governments to help cut binge drinking among youth.

Through the Health Foundation's Shift + initiative, a Social Host Ordinance was approved by Deming County

Commissioners.

IMPACT on Behavioral Health

With great leadership and collaboration facilitated by the Paso del Norte Health Foundation, the El Paso Behavioral Health Consortium is realizing lasting IMPACT in its efforts to build one of the finest behavioral health systems in the nation.

The Consortium partners collaboratively funded and entrusted their key data to complete an in-depth assessment of the needs, services and resources within the El Paso County behavioral health system. The Consortium Executive Committee then took action with strong mutual commitment to share what was learned from the 2014 El Paso County Behavioral Health System Assessment and build a foundation for lasting collaboration. The Health Foundation took on the task of building three leadership councils. Each council works to align existing behavioral healthcare and support systems toward the common goal of an accessible, person-centered behavioral health system of care for the El Paso region.

The Family Leadership Council builds collaboration among child, adolescent, and family health organizations; other child-serving agencies; and natural support systems to transform the current system into a nurturing behavioral health system model for children and families.

One example of the power of collaboration can be seen within the Family Leadership Council. Child Protective Services Director Diana Barajas took on a lead role as Chair of the Mental Health Foster Care Work Group. She convened a series of intensive sessions to map services among the Department of Family and Protective Services, the El Paso Psychiatric Center, the local Mental Health Authority, and Private Inpatient Facilities in an effort to streamline communication when foster care children and youth move from inpatient care back into the community. The coordination among all these professionals showed immediate improvements in case management and person-centered care. The work group partners are now amending organizational policy and practice to maintain these improvements.

CONTINUUM MENTAL HEALTH CARE TEAM

The Integration Leadership Council builds collaboration among healthcare providers to increase access to recovery-oriented behavioral healthcare by increasing the number of available providers and by integrating behavioral health and recovery supports into primary care settings.

The Justice Leadership Council builds collaboration among El Paso County justice system leaders and community stakeholders to transform policy and practices that address behavioral healthcare for justice-involved individuals.










IMPACT on Fruit and Vegetable Consumption

Fruit and vegetable consumption is associated with multiple positive health outcomes, yet current national and local rates remain low (i.e., 24% and 19% consume ≥ 5 servings of fruits and vegetables, respectively). With support from the Paso del Norte Health Foundation, a team from the Marketing Department at New Mexico State University deployed an already successful socially-based "rule-of-thumb" health intervention to increase by 10% the purchase of fruits and vegetables by consumers in several regional grocery stores in (Alamogordo, Las Cruces and Tularosa) New Mexico without significantly increasing their budget.

This was done by providing grocery shoppers easy access to information related to how many fruits and vegetables were commonly purchased in the store (e.g., 5 fruits and vegetables) as well as the related health benefits. Placards were added to the inside and outside front of all grocery carts where shoppers could view. The placards described how many fruits and vegetables were purchased on average and which fruits and vegetables were most popular. Also to attract shoppers, large floor stickers were placed in the store areas with the most foot traffic (i.e., the perimeter of the store). These stickers pointed customers to the produce section with one of three phrases: "Follow the green arrow for your health"; "Follow the green arrow for a healthy heart"; "Follow the green arrow for a healthy weight."

Impact on Fruit and Vegetable Consumption (continued)





After several weeks of studies, there was a significant increase in fruit and vegetable purchases, without increasing shopper budgets or decreasing store profitability. This intervention created a major IMPACT in how to increase fruit and vegetable consumption in the region. Today, the program team is working with the USDA-Economic Research Service and Pay N' Save, Inc. to disseminate these types of interventions throughout their stores with additional in-store marketing interventions being conceptualized and tested.

IMPACT on Underage Drinking

Local social host policies help communities reduce the number of large underage drinking parties.

After one year of intense training on both sides of the U.S./Mexico border, members of the Paso del Norte Health Foundation's Shift + initiative coalition are advocating for public policies to address environmental risk factors that contribute to underage and binge drinking in the region.

Youth and young adults are particularly vulnerable to the negative consequences of binge drinking (5 or more drinks in a row for men; 4 or more for women) including sexual assaults, unintended pregnancies, and unintended injuries. In Luna County, New Mexico advocates are making an IMPACT by reducing social access to alcohol among young people in their communities. Members of the Luna County Partnerships for Success II coalition participated in the Shift+ training program and in January 2016, Luna County adopted the first Social Host Ordinance in the Paso del Norte region. Under the new ordinance, law enforcement personnel can now write a civil citation to the person or persons responsible for underage drinking parties or unruly gatherings. Data show that the most underage drinking, and in many instances binge drinking, among young people happens in social settings, or "house parties." Emerging research

Impact on Underage Drinking (continued)

shows that these ordinances reduce the number of large house parties and the number of youth who drink in these high-risk settings.

Luna County set the stage for other communities in the Paso del Norte region to improve local policy to reduce underage drinking and related consequences. Initiative partners in other counties are advocating for social host ordinances in their own communities as well. Meanwhile, the Shift+ team is also assessing risk factors in the retail alcohol environment and advocating for best practices and policies at the local level to reduce these risks.

IMPACT over Twenty Years

The Paso del Norte Health Foundation has been at the forefront in improving the health and well-being of the residents in the Paso del Norte region for the past 20 years.

When Tenet Healthcare Corporation took over the operations of Providence Memorial Hospital on Sunday, Oct. 1, 1995, the Paso del Norte Health Foundation came into being with \$130 million in assets.

Today, the Paso del Norte Health Foundation is the largest private foundation on the U.S.-Mexico border and has invested more than \$141 million in the pursuit of its health-conscious mission, exceeding the \$130 million the Health Foundation initially received from the sale of Providence Memorial Hospital.

The history of this unique transaction dates back to 1902 when a group of doctors and businessmen in El Paso established Providence Hospital, the city's first non-denominational hospital. Faced with the challenges of growth and spurred on by the passage of the federal Hill-Burton Act of 1946, Providence eventually transitioned from a small, private hospital to a public, not-for-profit hospital with a mission to be the finest medical facility between Los Angeles and Dallas.

The eventual sale of Providence Memorial Hospital to Tenet Healthcare came during a period of increased hospital industry consolidation in the mid-1990s. When Tenet purchased Providence Memorial Hospital, the assets immediately went toward the establishment of a new community health foundation whose mission would be "to effect long-term improvements in the health status of the population of the greater El Paso region through education and prevention."

In its first year of operation the Paso del Norte Health Foundation worked to identify the health needs of the region comprising far west Texas, southern New Mexico and the municipality of Ciudad Juárez, Mexico. Since then, it has awarded grants to more than 300 organizations across the region, all in pursuit of "creating a region driven by the power of healthy living."

Impact over Twenty Years (continued)

In celebration of its 20th Anniversary, the Health Foundation held three events to recognize the individuals who helped to form the original Providence Hospital, Providence Memorial Hospital and the Health Foundation.

Special thanks to Judy Robison and Bert Mijares, Co-Chairs of the 20th Anniversary committee, and all committee members for leading the celebration.



Legacy Event

Descendants of Dr. and Mrs. M.P. Shuster and of the founding board of Providence Memorial Hospital attended an afternoon reception to honor those who contributed to improving the health of the people in the border region for more than 100 years.

Anniversary Event

More than 400 guests joined the Paso del Norte Health Foundation board of directors to celebrate the anniversary of the Health Foundation, its accomplishments, and to hear about emerging projects for the future. Sally Hurt-Deitch, Market Chief Executive Officer of The Hospitals of Providence, welcomed attendees and emphasized the importance of partnerships to create systemic change in the health of the region now and into the future. Dr. Abraham Verghese spoke on the importance of "care" and empathy for those serving in the health care professions. Dr. Verghese was a Professor of Medicine and Chief of the Division of Infectious Diseases at Texas Tech Health Sciences Center in El Paso. He practiced medicine at Thomason Hospital from 1991 to 2002.

Grantee Event

The Health Foundation also celebrated with past and current grantees to thank them for their hard work and dedication to promoting healthy behaviors. More than 150 grantees joined in the breakfast celebration, with guest speaker U.S. Congressman Beto O'Rourke. The Congressman spoke about the role of leadership to create change for a better community and the need for improved behavioral health services for veterans in the El Paso area.





Donor-Advised Funds: Loaves & Fishes Fund

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

CHALLENGE FUND




